

## Lower Costs, Better Care for Massachusetts Seniors: Medicare After The Affordable Care Act

The Affordable Care Act strengthens Medicare and helps 1.1 million seniors and people on Medicare in Massachusetts take charge of their health. The law provides important benefits such as free preventive services, free annual wellness visits, a 50 percent discount on prescription drugs for Medicare recipients in the coverage gap known as the “donut hole,” and a phase-out of the donut hole altogether by 2020. Medicare is now more affordable, with lower premiums and cost sharing, and continues to offer enrollees a choice of a private Medicare Advantage plan. These benefits are already making a difference in the lives of seniors. The chart below highlights how seniors in Massachusetts have seen their Medicare benefits improve in the last year.

<b>More Affordable Prescription Drugs</b>	70,524 Massachusetts residents on Medicare who hit the Medicare prescription drug donut hole received a tax-free \$250 rebate check. As a result, Medicare enrollees in Massachusetts saved \$17.6 million.	All Massachusetts residents on Medicare who hit the prescription drug donut hole will receive a 50 percent discount on their brand name prescription drugs and cheaper generic drugs. As of March, enrollees hitting the donut hole nationwide had already saved an average of \$800 on their prescription drugs.
<b>Free Preventive Services</b>	Medicare charged co-pays and deductibles for preventive services like mammograms and other cancer screenings to the 1 million Massachusetts residents on Medicare.	All 1.1 million Massachusetts residents on Medicare may receive recommended preventive services with no out-of-pocket costs.
<b>Free Annual Wellness Visit</b>	Medicare did not offer a free annual checkup to the 1 million Massachusetts residents on Medicare.	All Massachusetts residents on Medicare may receive a free annual wellness visit. As of April 20, 26,936 people on Medicare in Massachusetts have received a free annual wellness visit.
<b>Lower than Projected Premiums</b>	All 1 million Massachusetts residents on Medicare paid nearly \$8 less per month in Medicare Part B Premiums than the Medicare Trustees projected in 2009.	All 1.1 million Massachusetts residents on Medicare now pay nearly \$5 less per month in Medicare Part B Premiums than the Medicare Trustees projected in 2009. In 2011, this will save a total of \$62.1 million on premiums for Medicare enrollees in Massachusetts.
<b>Medicare Advantage</b>	100 percent of Massachusetts residents on Medicare had the option of joining a Medicare Advantage plan.	100 percent of Massachusetts residents on Medicare have the option of joining a Medicare Advantage plan.
