\$2.4 billion in private sector commitments and \$6.9 billion in public investments in clean energy, infrastructure, and manufacturing under President Biden

\$1.6B in funding from the Biden Administration to provide affordable, reliable high-speed internet to everyone in Wisconsin.



3% unemployment rate with 177.7k new jobs created under the Biden Administration.



\$4B announced for transportation investments in roads, bridges, public transit, rail, ports and airports, as well as electric school buses and transit buses, EV charging, and more.



\$811.8M announced to provide clean water across Wisconsin and improve water infrastructure. This includes \$129.5M dedicated to replacing toxic lead pipes.



\$192M in private sector commitments to invest in semiconductors and electronics.

Project Spotlights

- ★ Columbia County will receive \$80 million from the U.S. Department of Transportation to replace the existing I-39/90/94 Wisconsin River Bridge with two new bridge spans that serve traffic flowing in opposite directions.
- ★ A \$13.5 million U.S. Department of Transportation grant will help fund the replacement of an existing two-lane structure over Springbrook Creek in northeastern Wisconsin with a new four-lane bridge that includes both bicycle and pedestrian accommodations.
- ★ EPA has awarded \$130 million to Wisconsin to accelerate progress towards President Biden's goal of replacing every toxic lead pipe in the country. This includes \$30 million awarded to Milwaukee for lead pipe replacement.
- ★ The Department of Transportation awarded \$1 billion to replace the Blatnik Bridge between Superior, Wisconsin and Duluth, Minnesota, increasing bridge capacity and creating a new shared-use path for cyclists and pedestrians to access both states easily.

Infrastructure

- **\$6.6 billion** in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding has been announced to Wisconsin for **513 projects**, including:
 - **\$4 billion for transportation:** \$3.1 billion for roads and bridges, \$380.6 million for public transit, \$129.4 million for airports, \$41.3 million for ports and waterways.
 - **\$1.4 billion for high-speed internet.**
 - **\$510.4 million for clean water**, including \$129.5 million to replace toxic lead pipes.
 - **\$113.4 million for clean transportation:** \$45.1 million for EV chargers, \$42.4 million for clean transit buses, and \$25.8 million for clean school buses.
 - **\$18.6 million to clean up legacy pollution.**
 - **\$127.2 million for resilience**, to strengthen our communities' readiness for climate impacts and other threats.

Clean Energy and Climate

- Under the Biden-Harris Administration, private companies have announced **\$2.4 billion** in commitments to invest in 21st century industries, including:
 - **\$1.6 billion** for clean power projects, including solar, wind, and batteries.
 - **\$170 million** for clean energy manufacturing.
- **\$421.4 million** in public funding has been announced for grants, rebates, and other initiatives to accelerate the deployment of clean energy, clean buildings, and clean manufacturing. This is not inclusive of the clean energy tax incentives from the Inflation Reduction Act.

Lowering Costs

- **\$149.4 million** in home energy rebates to cut energy costs by weatherizing homes and replacing old appliances with more efficient models.
- **1.3 million** seniors and other Medicare beneficiaries will save money on prescription drug costs because of President Biden's \$2,000 yearly cap on out-of-pocket prescription drug costs, a \$35 monthly cap per insulin prescription, free vaccines, inflation rebates, and a drug price negotiation program.
- **266,000** individuals in Wisconsin signed up for health insurance through the Affordable Care Act Marketplaces during the Open Enrollment Period for 2023 and will benefit from average savings of about \$800/year from lower health care premiums.
