

STOPPING THE INVASION & VIOLENT CRIME

President Trump is committed to investing in efforts to stop violent crime and eliminating the funding of our own invasion. The President's FY 2027 Budget fully funds a strong border, the removal of violent criminal aliens from our streets, and stops the endless stream of benefits to illegal aliens given preference over American citizens.

Highlights of Investments Focused on Stopping Violent Crime:

- **Federal Law Enforcement.** The President has deployed the full strength of the Department of Justice (DOJ) to fight violent crime, targeting the most dangerous cities with dynamic and unprecedented enforcement efforts. The 2027 Budget invests more than \$19 billion for Federal law enforcement, a 15 percent increase from the 2026 enacted level. This significant increase funds more agents working to capture illegal aliens, supports the Department of Homeland Security (DHS)'s Homeland Security Task Forces that hunt down transnational criminals, expands Southwest Border strike forces that takedown illegal firearms traffickers supplying Mexican drug cartels, and funds more attorneys to prosecute violent criminals and criminal illegal aliens who commit harms to our communities.
- **Working Families Tax Cut (WFTC).** The WFTC appropriated more than \$190 billion in additional multiyear budget authority for DHS to implement the Administration's priorities in the homeland security space, of which at least an estimated \$31.4 billion will be allocated in 2027. Reconciliation funding in 2027 will enable DHS to fully implement the President's immigration enforcement initiatives, finish construction of the border wall on the Southwest border, procure advanced border security technology, and continue the largest recapitalization investment in the history of the U.S. Coast Guard. It also provided \$3.3 billion in multi-year funding to DOJ to combat drug trafficking and investigate and prosecute immigration matters. DOJ is actively executing WFTC funding to increase agents dedicated to HSTF, transnational organized crime, and immigration operation support.
- **Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR).** The 2027 Budget supports DOJ's efforts to expeditiously remove criminal illegal aliens who pose a threat to the life and property of American citizens by prosing \$899 million for EOIR (+\$99 million over FY 2026 enacted), which will equip DOJ to maintain the immigration judge corps and expand courtroom space to conduct deportation hearings.
- **Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).** The Budget maintains critical funding for Immigration and Customs Enforcement, equal to the 2026 level, including \$2.2 billion to maintain 41,500 immigration detention beds at base levels. WFTC provided \$75 billion for ICE to implement the Administration's immigration priorities, including \$45 billion for ICE to activate up to 100,000 single adult detention beds and up to 30,000 family unit beds, \$15.4 billion for enhancements to ground and air transportation capabilities to maximize the number of annual removals, and authorized a 67 percent increase in ICE staffing through 2029.
- **United States Coast Guard.** The Budget increases funding for Coast Guard operations by \$2.1 billion above the 2026 level, in order to fully pay our military service members and fund the Commandant's Force Design 2028 initiative. This initiative will get the Coast Guard on track to manage its multi-faceted mission more effectively, including interdicting migrants and illicit drugs at sea before they ever reach American shores. WFTC provided \$25 billion for the Coast Guard to procure new cutters and aircraft, and modernize shore infrastructure and maritime surveillance systems, which together

will strengthen the Service's role as the Nation's leading drug interdiction and maritime border security force.

Highlights of Cuts to Defund the Border Invasion:

- **Unaccompanied Alien Children (UAC).** The Budget re-focuses the UAC program on its core mission of sheltering unaccompanied children while protecting them from trafficking and exploitation, including locating the hundreds of thousands of children the Biden Administration lost. The Trump Administration's end to open borders means new arrivals are at historic lows, averaging only eight per day, a stark contrast from the Biden-Harris Administration which at times was admitting 640 UAC per day. Balancing the decline in new arrivals with a new \$300 million investment from WFTC for enhanced UAC sponsor vetting, the Budget proposes to right size for the overhauled UAC program.
- **Refugee Resettlement Program.** The Budget eliminates cash handouts and free healthcare used to welcome millions of illegal immigrants into the United States to the detriment of American citizens. Under the previous Administration, these programs funneled money to woke nonprofits that were complicit in illegal migration and used taxpayer dollars to provide immigrants with things housing, below-market rate interest loans to start businesses, and land to start farms.
